

Recognizing the Importance of the FBI's Law Enforcement Systems and Immigration

N-DEX (The National Data Exchange System)

Provides agencies with an investigative tool to search, link, analyze, and share criminal justice information by integrating data from federal, state, local, and tribal law enforcement. N-DEX serves as a data repository and search system used by over 70,000 law enforcement officers.

- Immigration Alien Queries (IAQs): Criminal justice agencies can submit IAQs to ICE to get real-time immigration status determinations.
- Information sharing: N-DEX can help fill gaps in information and provide situational awareness.

NCIC (National Crime Information Center)

A computerized index of criminal justice information (i.e.- criminal record history information, fugitives, stolen properties, missing persons). It is available to Federal, state, and local law enforcement and other criminal justice agencies and is operational 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.

How is the NCIC used for immigration enforcement?

- Police use the NCIC to look up background information on people they encounter.
- Police can use this information to report individuals to ICE.

NGI (Next Generation Identification)

The FBI's biometric repository considered one of the largest biometric databases in the world, NGI stores individual fingerprint records and other biometric data for criminal and civil matters. Advanced identification technology provides rapid, efficient, and accurate fingerprint processing.

Since 2014, FBI and DHS biometric systems have worked together through interoperability agreements and data-sharing frameworks to enhance national security, law enforcement, and immigration enforcement.
